Thai Elephants, the Pride of Thailand

Thai elephants are held in the highest esteem by the people of Thailand, having served loyally alongside past kings in the protection of the nation's freedom. The animals stand tall, both in terms of physical stature and dignity.

Apart from their socially-prestigious status and their bravery displayed in battle, Thai elephants have been an integral part of the Thai way of life for centuries, serving as a means of transport and as workers in the timber industry. They have traditionally been nurtured as a part of the family and a strong, unique relationship has developed between animals and humans as they live communally.

> In contrast to reputations earned due to their large size and fierce fighting qualities, Thai elephants are now respected for more refined and delicate skills; such as, painting and playing musical instruments. Such performances are amazing to watch.

> > Thai elephants are one of the most valuable, natural resources in the Kingdom of Thailand. To spend some time with them, several days or just a few moments, makes one realise their significance to this nation and the powerful impact that they have on the hearts of all who meet them.





The Legend of Thai Elephants

Elephants are not just ordinary animals to the Thai nation but represent royal power and freedom as many have sacrificed their lives fighting alongside past kings. A journey to Ayutthaya traces the glorious history of Thai elephants and gives the impression that the gigantic size of these elephants is only dwarfed by the strength and loyalty of their hearts. A visit to the Royal Elephant Kraal offers visitors a priceless insight into the proud and dignified role that elephants have played in the history of Thailand's freedom.

The owner of the Royal Elephant Kraal, Laithongrien Meephan, aims to establish it as a celebration of Thai culture. The Royal Elephant Kraal is a place that contains everything one wants to know about Thai elephants their role in the country's history and its traditions, the animals' biology, information about their healthcare, and the Royal Elephant Kraal's breeding programme. A visit to the Royal Elephant Kraal allows visitors to observe these magnificent creatures and to start to understand their way of life. In this way, visitors begin to make a small contribution to the elephants' survival in this world.

We should be proud that today there is still a number of elephants living in Thailand because they have been the nation's guardian, fighting alongside the kings since ancient history." Royal Elephant Kraal, an extraordinary tale from the past



Apart from this association with the kings in battle, elephants were also used in many important ceremonies. During the Ayutthaya period, the best elephants were selected from the roundup for participation in these rituals. The roundup was organized at the Royal Elephant Kraal and normally lasted for four days following the directions of "Tamra Luang" or the Royal manuscript. On the first day, the elephants were herded into the enclosure and a preliminary selection of the finest animals was made on the made on day 3 as the elephants the final day saw the best in the jungle

The Royal Elephant Kraal is the place where the roundup of royal elephants occurred in ancient times. It was located next to Chankasem Palace but Somdet Phra Maha Chakkraphat moved it to its present site during his reign between 910-930 A.D. Elephants are regarded as the royal symbol of Thailand and have long served the country in numerous ways; for example, as mounts for past kings in battles for national freedom. A white elephant is considered auspicious and is preserved as the special property of the King.

The royal elephant roundup became not only a selection of the finest elephants, but also a popular community gathering of entertainers and travellers. It occurred annually in the city of Ayutthaya until it was attacked and left in ruins by the Burmese in 1767. The Kraal was almost completely destroyed but was restored at the beginning of the Rattanakosin Period. The last royal elephant roundup was in 1903 during the reign of King Rama V.



Ride an elephant to get an idea of the past glory of Ayutthaya

The Royal Elephant Kraal takes visitors back to ancient times by following the royal routes once taken by kings and by showing evidence of some of the history of this former capital city. City Pillar, Wat Ket, and Phrachao U Thong Monument are a few landmarks that illustrate the beauty and prosperity of Ayutthaya in past times.

Learn to be a mahout

The mahout training programme allows visitors to understand the life of the mahout and the unique personality of the elephant. The programme includes various engaging activities; such as, learning to ride, bathe and feed the elephants correctly, and most importantly, showing them love and affection.



Watch the training of the baby elephants

In the picturesque, natural surroundings along the Lop Buri River, the Elephant Whisperer School is the place where visitors can observe the training of baby elephants. These innocent youngsters touch the hearts of all audience members.

> "Lae Phaniat" is Thai for "Kraal"-"Lae" is an ancient Thai word meaning "look," and "Pha-niat" is a place used for elephants' roundups since the Ayutthaya period. An ancient belief of the

> An ancient belief of the Thai people is that taking care of elephants needs to be done with faith and respect as the elephants are believed to possess power and prestigious souls.





Early evening is the time when herds of elephants wade into the Lop Buri River to take a bath and relax after a long day. Visitors enjoy the sight of elephants splashing in the water as the mahouts reward the elephants for their hard work by brushing and bathing them.








Watch the elephants re-enacting an ancient battle

The elephants are able to show visitors glimpses of their glorious military past through their re-enactments of ancient battles in Muban Phaniat Luang. The show starts with the "wai khru" ceremony in which the elephants make a bawling noise to show their uplifting spirits and then parade in the arena. The most dramatic part of the show is the elephants' duel.

Watch a performance of skills by the elephants

Elephants at the Royal Elephant Kraal are professionally trained to show their surprisingly skillful performances of painting and greeting visitors.







> Play with baby elephants

On average, there is one baby elephant born per month at the Royal Elephant Kraal, therefore, it is not surprising to get the chance of seeing a small baby elephant roaming around the village. Saying hello to and feeding the babies is a heart-warming experience not to be missed.

Did you know? • Elephants that are appointed as the Royal Elephants are called "chang ton" and are then separated into "chang suck" (battle elephant) and "chang phueak" (white elephant).

 Apart from transforming elephant dung into fertilizer, it can also be made into paper, bookmarks, and notebooks.

An inspiring journey to understand the mahouts' and the elephants' way of life is a sound start to the conservation of elephants for future generations. Thai Elephant Conservation Centre (National Elephant Institute) Lampang Province

Thai Elephant Conservation Centre (also known as the National Elephant Institute) started as a training centre for baby elephant Today, it is the world's leading mahout training school and a hospital for elephants.

(🖕 Thai Elephant Conservation Centre provides comprehensive care for elephants and a place for those interested in studying the animals. The activities available at the centre are designed to give visitors the opportunity to establish relationships with the elephants and to appreciate their role in the world. Some people spend a few hours and others stay for days at the institute - whatever the timeframe, a visit is an important starting point in understanding these magnificent creatures.

Our main objectives are to develop people's knowledge and awareness of elephants to promote elephant conservation, as well as to preserve local traditions and wisdom for future generations."





Ride an elephant in a natural setting

While riding an elephant, visitors are immersed in the beauty of nature and the unique way of life of the mahout, but they also discover the fascinating personality of the elephant hidden within that huge body.

Learn to be a mahout

The National Elephant Institute established the Mahout Training School to provide visitors with information about the nature and well-being of elephants. The training ranges from a one-day to a 30-day programme, depending on visitors' preferences.

Mahout Training Programme Day One

- Morning Participants register and change into mahout outfits before meeting their elephants and mahouts. The first session introduces the correct ways to approach and ride an elephant and practice of these skills.
- Afternoon The afternoon session involves riding an elephant to the bathing area and performing in the elephant show for regular tourists. Participants develop their skills and finish off the day by taking their elephants back to rest in the forest.

Day Two

Morning Participants collect their elephants from the forest and feed them bananas and sugarcane. The riders bathe their elephants and then perform in the elephant show for regular tourists. The morning session is completed by a visit to the elephants' hospital.

Afternoon The afternoon session involves a bath and a performance in the elephant show for regular tourists. Participants continue to refine their riding skills with further activities before taking their elephants back to rest in the forest.

Day Three

Morning Participants collect their elephants from the forest and feed them bananas and sugarcane. The riders bathe their elephants and then perform in the elephant show for regular tourists. The programme concludes with the presentation of certificates and farewells to the elephants.

Remarks: Please make reservations 7 days prior to the programme.



Live in a home-stay in a mahout village

Visitors have the opportunity to experience first-hand the daily lifestyle of a mahout. Activities include collecting the elephants from the forest in the morning, learning to ride and give basic commands, and returning them to rest in the forest in the evening.



The National Elephant Institute established the Pang La Elephant Nursery Centre as a retirement place for sick, old, and /or crippled elephants, complete with a professional team of mahouts and veterinarians to take care of them.

Visit the elephant hospital

The elephant hospital at the National Elephant Institute provides free medical care to sick, injured, old, and dangerous elephants. A visit to the hospital is a way in which people can show their support for the conservation of Thai elephants for future generations.

Visit the dung paper factory

Visitors can observe the transformation of elephant waste into elephant dung paper in the production of notebooks, lanterns, and paper umbrellas.

Watch the elephant show

The elephant show displays the animals' wide array of talents, from delicate skills of drawing and playing musical instruments to heavy labour activities such as hauling logs.

Help the elephants

Lampang Elephant Art Academy and the Thai Elephant Orchestra :

These two projects were launched to sell paintings and CDs produced by the elephants to support the funding of food, medication, welfare, and conservation of Thai elephants.

Elephant Adoption Project :

The National Elephant Institute currently takes care of over 90 elephants, 43 of whom need sponsoring. Those who wish to adopt an elephant can contact the centre for more information.

► A tip to enjoy your elephant time

 Initially, spending time with the mahout might be awkward, but learning their way of life and culture promotes the development of a beautiful friendship.

• The most suitable shoes to wear when riding an elephant are hiking sandals as they can be worn comfortably in water and in the forest.

· Kantok Chang or Satok Chang Event is organised at the National Elephant Institute on the first Friday and Saturday of February in every year, where the elephants get to enjoy a big meal together and visitors are invited to watch the elephant show while having a Kantok meal.



Mahout Training Programme Daily Programme

Experience by staff who introduce the activities of the programme. Initially, visitors change into mahouts' outfits and meet the elephants and mahouts. There are a series of familiarization activities involving the visitors and the elephants, followed by bathing, communicating, and riding lessons. the jungle and experience the lifestyle of the mahouts. On returning to the camp, activities. The programme concludes with visitors enjoying a relaxing bamboo raft ride in the peaceful surroundings of the Mae Taeng River.





Watch the elephants bathe

Visitors can witness the elephants enjoying different ways of relaxing in the water, swimming, splashing, or simply just sitting. In the dry season, visitors can join the elephants in the water activities.

Learn to be a mahout

The mahout training programme enables visitors to learn about the elephants. Not only do visitors get a deeper understanding of the elephants but they also acquire an understanding of the incredible bond between the animals and humans.



Ride an elephant in a serene natural setting

The trails at ELE allow visitors to experience an exotic encounter with nature while riding an elephant. Visitors are fascinated by the breathtaking scenery of the Mae Taman Valley and Mae Taeng River at the same time as learning about the marvelous elephants.



Elephants at ELE are skillful artists who paint in different styles such as realism. abstract. and pointillism.



Bamboo raft along the Mae Taeng River

One of the leisure activities at ELE is to take a journey along Mae Taeng River on a bamboo raft to enjoy the tranquility of nature. This activity also allows visitors to experience and appreciate the way of life of the local people.

For more excitement when riding an elephant bare-back, try sitting on its head with your legs resting on its trunk and your hands grasping its ears. Once relaxed in this position, you find that this is one of the most comfortable ways to ride an elephant.

Learn the history of the elephants

Visitors to Patara Elephant Farm are given an outline of the elephants as the national symbol through a brief history of their roles in ancient wars and the importance of their work skills to the development of the forestry industry.

Learn about the biology and healthcare of the elephants

The elephant is the largest living land mammal – intelligent, emotional, and with a good memory, just like humans.

Visitors learn how the mahouts perform daily health

checkups of the elephants, observing their moods, checking their skin, and inspecting their dung.



Learn about the breeding of the elephants

The mission of Patara Elephant Farm is to increase the number of healthy elephants in Thailand. Part of this is achieved by providing information about the farm's breeding programme to visitors. There are only about 3,000 elephants remaining in Thailand, a number that is decreasing at an alarming rate. Patara Elephant Farm believes it has an important role in educating visitors about the conservation of these animals.

Relax with an elephant

Patara Elephant Farm provides visitors with opportunities for visitors and elephants to relax with each other. Visitors wear the mahout uniform and learn to approach the elephant by feeding them grass, bananas,

sugarcane. Touching and stroking the elephants correctly is a technique visitors learn, leading to the development of trust, understanding, and friendship between human and animal.



"Elephant Owner for a Day" programme

Morning The session starts with an outline of the basics of the elephants; such as, their origin, nature, way of life, and care. Visitors are introduced to the farm, its objectives, the mahouts, and the elephants themselves. Then they learn how to approach the elephants, chain and unchain them, learn the correct way to ride on the neck, and how to give different kinds of spoken commands. Late morning Bathe the elephants, ride

Afternoon

- through the jungle to the waterfall, and have a water fight before having lunch together.
- Take the elephants home for a rest, feed them, and take photos as souvenirs of unforgettable experiences.
- Remarks: Please make reservations 7 days prior to the programme.



Ride an elephant to the waterfall

An excursion through the jungle to the waterfall on an elephant's back is more difficult than the normal route but it is more exciting as both the elephant and the rider negotiate the uneven terrain through water and mud. This thrilling journey allows visitors to appreciate the elephant's skills from first-hand experience.

Enjoy the natural setting and the locals' way of life

Visitors are encouraged to ride an elephant bare-back and experience a silent journey through the forest. The head of the elephant is wide and provides a comfortable perch from which the rider can observe the natural surroundings and the unique way of life of the local people.

Remarks: This activity can be customized to suit senior travellers and travellers with disabilities.

Help the elephants

Patara Elephant Farm is concerned about the decreasing number of elephants in Thailand. Thus the farm has established a breeding farm to increase the birthrate of the elephants as well as to ensure that they are well taken care of, to produce healthy and happy breeders.

A tip to enjoy your elephant time

· Don't worry about taking pictures or videos of your day at the farm - Patara Elephant Farm provides a team of professional photographers and camerapersons who complimentarily capture every moment of your day.

· When bathing the elephants, stand about 1-2 metres away from the animals and splash a basketful of water on them. They love it!

Elephants consume about 250-350 kilogrammes of food and drink approximately 60 gallons of water a day. The gestation period of elephants lasts around 18-23 months, with most female babies being born at 18-20 months and male babies at 21-23 months.





The best place for an elephant to call home is one endowed with the natural beauty of jungle, river and clean air – Mae Ping Elephant Village is just such a place, complete with caring mahouts who genuinely enjoy looking after them.

The major objective of Mae Ping Elephant Village is to offer work and shelter in a safe, natural setting for elephants and mahouts. Approximately 60 elephants live in the village, each the focus of much love and attention. All activities, whether culture-or adventure-based, at Mae Ping Elephant Village are conducted in an atmosphere of fun and care that allows elephants, mahouts, and visitors to develop a respectful, loving bond.

Ride an elephant and enjoy the tranquility of nature

Visitors are invited to immerse themselves in the peaceful, natural environment on the back of an elephant. They not only get to enjoy the beautiful scenery but also to explore the way of life of the Lisu hill-tribe people.

Learn to be a mahout

Mae Ping Elephant Village provides several types of mahout training programme ranging from a one day to a 3 days/2 nights' programme. Each one has the same objective of providing the chance for visitors to have first-hand experience of living as a mahout and caring for and understanding the daily lives of the elephants.

Mahout Training Programme Day One

Morning Stop at Kat Mae Malai on the way to Mae Ping Elephant Village to buy fresh ingredients for the cooking course included in this programme.

- Afternoon The mahout training programme begins with an introduction to the biology, nature, and healthcare of the elephants. Visitors then learn how to communicate with, control, and feed the elephants.
- Evening Enjoy dinner and rest overnight at the village.

Day Two

- Morning Enjoy breakfast and familiarization with the elephants.
- Afternoon Feed the elephants and ride an elephant to the jungle.*

*Riding an elephant to the jungle allows the elephants to get some effective rest and relaxation, eating natural grass and leaves and enjoying the shade of the big trees.

Evening Enjoy a barbeque dinner and rest overnight at the village.

Day Three

Morning Visitors watch demonstrations of the capture of wild elephants using different techniques and equipment. The programme finishes with a ceremony at which Mae Ping Elephant Village presents mahout certificates to the participants.

Remarks: Please make reservations 7 days prior to the programme.

An elephant normally sleeps on its side so every morning the mahouts check for any leaves and/or soil sticking to the elephant's body as part of the daily healthcare programme.



▶ Ride in an ox-cart

Ox-carts were an important means of transport in the past but they are seldom used now. Mae Ping Elephant Village provides visitors with the opportunity to get a taste of a traditional feature of past Thailand by riding in the back of an ox-cart to enjoy the natural scenery and observe village life.



Bamboo raft along the Mae Ping River

The bamboo raft drifts along the peaceful Mae Ping River, showcasing the magnificence of the mountains and the simple, river-based way of life of the hill-tribe people.

> Watch the elephant show

Discover the elephants' talents by watching their performances of dancing, drawing, and playing mouth-organs, soccer, and volleyball. These startling skills performed by such large animals surprise visitors.

Bathe an elephant

Visitors learn how to correctly bathe elephants by brushing and pouring water over them. This activity often finishes with a water fight session between the visitors and the elephants.

Learn how to grow rice

Visitors who visit Mae Ping Elephant Village during the rice season (May-July) can participate in activities in rice cultivation and harvesting.

Learn to cook Thai food

Cooking lessons at Mae Ping Elephant Village are conducted by an experienced chef who introduces visitors to the basic skills of cooking Thai food that they can repeat at home.



Help the elephants

Mae Ping Elephant Village was established to provide work and shelter in natural surroundings for over 60 elephants and mahouts.

Muang Sing Elephant Village believes that a basic understanding of the animals is an essential part of having a great time with them.

Learn to be a mahout

The mahout training programme at Muang Sing Elephant Village concentrates on providing visitors with activities that enable them to get a real insight into being a mahout. Visitors start this programme by learning about the history and nature of Thai elephants, followed by training in the giving of basic commands and controlling the elephants. The programme finishes with instructions related to feeding and bathing the animals.

Muang Sing Elephant Village provides visitors with the opportunity to spend time with the elephants in the water. The staff guides the visitors on the correct bathing and brushing techniques required to properly clean the thick skin of the animals.



Bamboo raft along Khwae Noi River



A Unique Bond

The relationship between elephants and people is an extraordinary one, especially when the animals are treated with love and respect as family members. Living together harmoniously and sharing a love of nature creates an exclusive link that illustrates that genuine friendship and compatibility can truly exist between humans and animals.





There are few places in which one can experience the powerful bond between elephants and humans – the Elephant Study Centre Ta Klang Village in Surin Province is one of them. This Centre, the biggest home of elephants in Thailand, lets visitors capture the harmony of the fascinating relationship between elephants and members of the unique Kui culture.

The Elephant Study Centre Ta Klang Village was established to pass on to future generations the culture of the Kui, their knowledge about elephants, and to show the love that the Kui and elephants have for each other. Elephants are an integral part of Kui culture and almost every household has one as a family member.

Everyone who visits Ta Klang Village is touched by the understanding and respect that exists between the Kui and elephants. The differences between humans and elephants have no impact on one of the most loving relationships in the world.

Elephant Study Centre Ta Klang Village Surin Province

"For Kui people, the happiness of the elephant is as important as the happiness of a family member."

Get to know the Kui people, their way of life, traditions and culture

Originally from Kampongthom in Cambodia, the Kui migrated to Thailand towards the end of the Ayutthaya period. Before moving to Ta Klang Village, Tambon Krapho, Amphoe Tha Tum, the Kui lived in Ban Mueang Ling, Amphoe Chom Phra. Leading a simple way of life based on food from the forests, the Kui have a long tradition of capturing and training elephants.

Prior to the capture of the elephants, the Kui perform blessing rituals and delegate tasks to each person in order of their importance and seniority. The group is led by Khruba Yai who is the leader in the Pakam Spirit House worshipping ceremony. The second most important person is Khruba who leads the people into the forest to capture the wild elephants accompanied by Mo Sadam, the second-in-command mahout, who acquired this position from the experience of capturing at least 11 elephants.

The Kui capture the wild elephants from the forest using a lasso made from buffalo leather. Considered a sacred object, the lasso is believed to embody the spirits of the Kui's ancestors. Once the wild elephants are captured, the handlers use the lasso to tie the elephants to trees before training them for work.

In the past, this capture of elephants, known as a roundup, happened once a year and the elephants were trained and became workers in the family. As a result, they are treated as real family members and when they die, the corpse is buried properly before the making of merit and dedication to the spirits of the elephants. Even though the traditions of the Kui are slowly fading away, visitors can still experience this distinctive culture through many ceremonics that portray the legends of the elephants and the Kui in Surin province, the home of the largest number of elephants in the world.





Learn the Kui people's way of life and the stories of the elephants

The history of the Kui and the elephants is displayed for visitors to learn basic information and to gain an insight into the love between the people and the animals. This exhibition is an excellent way to start the activities at Ta Klang Village, as it explains the capture of the elephants, the equipment used, and the traditional rituals of the Kui.

• Explore the extraordinary talents of the elephants

Elephants are big animals but at the same time possess many astonishing skills; such as, playing soccer and basketball, drawing, and carefully stepping over people lying on the ground. Visitors also get the sense that the elephants are sensitive and full of emotions, just like humans beings.

Witness the Pakam Spirit House worshipping ceremony

The Kui believe that the Pakam Spirit House is a place where the spirits of their ancestors and the Pakam spirits reside. It is also the storage place for Pakam leather (buffalo leather) and equipment used in elephant activities. It is a highly revered ceremony and visitors are required to make a prior reservation to witness this ritual.



Ride an elephant

Visitors enjoy the scenery of the Ta Klang village as well as observe the simple but interesting way of life of the Kui and their inseparable bond with the elephants while riding on an elephant through the village.

> Splash water with the elephants

The elephants take a bath everyday at Wang Thalu where the Mun River meets the Chi River. Visitors are invited to help the mahouts bathe the elephants (and maybe even get into a water fight with them).



Learn to become a mahout in the Kui way

The Kui live a different lifestyle and have a different approach in taking care of the elephants from people in other parts of Thailand. Visitors are able to get a deeper understanding of the culture through a home-stay programme at Ta Klang Village.



• The 13th to 15th days of the 4th lunar month

mark the Buddhist Ordination Procession on elephant's back, a ritual for over 200 years. The monks-to-be gather at Wat Chaeng Sawang and parade on elephants to Wang Thalu where the Mun and Chi Rivers meet. The monks-to-be ride the elephants across the river to pay homage and ask for forgiveness from Chaopho Wang Thalu, the highly revered Spirit of the Kui, before starting the ordination.

Visitors are invited to offer alms to the monks who are on the backs of elephants.

This unique ceremony is held every year during Buddhist Lent in Surin province.



No matter where in the country they live, every elephant "comes home" to Surin, known worldwide as the home of elephants, to participate in this important ceremony.

Department of Livestock Development

The Bureau of Disease Control and Veterinary Services has established a set of standards for elephant camps in Thailand to promote the quality of these camps and to check on the safety of elephants and tourists. Initiated by the Ministry of Agriculture and Cooperatives, these guidelines also cover environmental management, health of the elephants, and improvements in the standards of living of elephants, mahouts, and business owners.

Office of Tourism Development

The Office of Tourism Development has created 4 criteria, 9 measures, and 146 requirements to guarantee the quality of the operation of elephant tourism services in Thailand. To comply, elephant camps must fulfill factors; such as, appropriate location and numbers of elephants and staff, competent management including the environment and safety, tourists' satisfaction with the quality of the camp, and a contribution to and by the local community.
